HOW TO PRAY

Is it best to pray standing up, sitting down, kneeling, or bowing? Should our hands be open, closed, or lifted up to God? Do our eyes need to be closed when we pray? Is it better to pray in a church building or out in nature? Should we pray in the morning or at night? Are there certain words we need to say in our prayers? These questions, and others, are common questions asked about prayer.

Far too often, prayer is viewed as a "magic formula." Some believe that if we do not say exactly the right things, or pray in the right position, God will not hear and answer our prayer. This is completely unbiblical. God does not answer our prayers based on when we pray, where we are, what position our body is in, or how we word our prayers. We are told in 1 John 5:14-15 to have confidence when we come to God in prayer, knowing He hears us and will grant whatever we ask as long as it is in His will.

The proper way to pray is to pour out our hearts, being honest and open with God, as He already knows us better than we know ourselves. We are to present our requests to God, keeping in mind that He knows what is best and will not grant a request that is not His will for us. We are to express our love, gratitude, and worship to God in prayer without worrying about having just the right words to say. God is more interested in the content of our hearts than the eloquence of our words.

The closest the Bible comes to giving a "pattern" for prayer is the Lord's Prayer. It is not a prayer we are to memorize and recite to God. We are to pray for the things the Lord's Prayer talks about, using our own words and "customizing" it to our own journey with God. The proper way to pray is to express our hearts to God. Sitting, standing, or kneeling; hands open or closed; eyes opened or closed; in a church, at home, or outside, these are all side issues, subject to personal preference. God's desire is for prayer to be a real and personal connection between Himself and us.

A 19-year-old student in Algeria has been ordered by her family to stop attending church and reading the Bible. The young woman, who recently converted to Christianity after watching Christian TV broadcasts, openly declared her faith to her science teacher who had denied Jesus' divinity and death on the cross. The school notified the young woman's family, who then began receiving threats from community members. The young woman hopes to attend a university where she might have more freedom to practice her new Christian faith.
